Information provided to the Commissioner

- A. The name of the Association is: Royal Association of Justices of Western Australia (Inc.);
- B. The objects of the Association are: The primary object is to support Justices of the Peace to professionally undertake their role as legislated in the *Justice of the Peace Act 2004 (WA)* for the benefit of the State and Public of Western Australia;
- C. Any 5 members personally present (being members entitled to vote under these rules at a general meeting) will constitute a quorum for the conduct of business at a general meeting;
- D. Any 3 Council members constitute a quorum for the conduct of the business of a Council meeting;
- E. The Association's financial year will be the period of 12 months commencing on 1 July and ending on 30 June of each year.

PART 1 - PRELIMINARY

1. Terms used

In these rules, unless the contrary intention appears —

Act means the Associations Incorporation Act 2015.

associate member means a member with the rights referred to in rule 8(6);

Association means the incorporated association to which these rules apply;

books, of the Association, includes the following —

- (a) a register;
- (b) financial records, financial statements or financial reports, however compiled, recorded or stored:
- (c) a document;
- (d) any other record of information;

branch means a subordinate group of members established under rule 51;

by laws means by-laws made by the Association under rule 66;

Commissioner means the person for the time being designated as the Commissioner under section 153 of the *Act*;

Council means the elected officers who constitute the Council of the Association;

Council meeting means a meeting of the Council;

Council member means a member of the Council;

Council is a term historically used by members to describe the Council which has contemporary meaning for many members;

Councillor means a person who is a member of the Council;

financial records include —

- (a) invoices, receipts, orders for the payment of money, bills of exchange, cheques, promissory notes and vouchers; and
- (b) documents of prime entry; and
- (c) working papers and other documents needed to explain
 - (i) the methods by which financial statements are prepared; and
 - (ii) adjustments to be made in preparing financial statements.

financial report, of a tier 2 Association or a tier 3 Association, has the meaning given in section 63 of the *Act*.

financial statements mean the financial statements in relation to the Association required under Part 5 Division 3 of the *Act*.

financial year, of the Association, has the meaning given in rule 2.

general meeting, of the Association, means a meeting of the Association that members only are entitled to receive notice of and to attend; others may attend subject to Council approval;

member means a person (including a body corporate) who is an ordinary member or an associate member of the Association;

ordinary Council member means a Council member who is not an office holder of the Association under rule 27:

ordinary member means a member with the rights referred to in rule 8(5);

President refers to the Council member holding office as the President of the Association;

register of members means the register of members referred to in section 53 of the Act;

Registrar means a person who the Council may appoint to assist with management of the day-to-day business of the Association:

rules mean these rules of the Association, as in force for the time being;

special general meeting means a general meeting of the Association other than the annual general meeting;

special resolution means a resolution passed by the members at a general meeting in accordance with section 51 of the Act;

subcommittee means a subcommittee appointed by the Council under rule 49(1)(a);

tier 1 Association means an incorporated Association to which section 64(1) of the Act applies;

tier 2 Association means an incorporated Association to which section 64(2) of the Act applies;

tier 3 Association means an incorporated Association to which section 64(3) of the Act applies;

Treasurer means the Council member holding office as the treasurer of the Association.

2. Financial year

- (1) The first financial year of the Association is to be the period notified to the Commissioner under section 7(4)(e) or, if relevant, section 29(5)(e) of the Act.
- (2) Each subsequent financial year of the Association is the period of 12 months commencing at the termination of the first financial year or the anniversary of that termination.

PART 2 - ASSOCIATION TO BE NOT FOR PROFIT BODY

3. Not-for-profit body

- (1) The property and income of the Association must be applied solely towards the promotion of the objects and/or purposes of the Association and no part of that property or income may be paid or otherwise distributed, whether directly or indirectly, to any member, except in good faith in the promotion of those objects or purposes.
- (2) A payment may be made to a member out of the funds of the Association, only if it is authorised under subrule (3).
- (3) A payment to a member out of the funds of the Association is only authorised if it is
 - (a) the payment in good faith to the member as reasonable remuneration for any services provided to the Association, or for goods supplied to the Association, in the ordinary course of business; or
 - (b) the payment of interest, on money borrowed by the Association from the member, at a rate not greater than the cash rate published from time to time by the Reserve Bank of Australia; or
 - (c) the payment of reasonable rent to the member for premises leased by the member to the Association; or
 - (d) the reimbursement of reasonable expenses properly incurred by the member on behalf of the Association.

PART 3 - MEMBERS

Division 1 — Membership

4. Eligibility for membership

- (1) Any person who supports the objectives or purposes of the Association is eligible to apply to become a member.
- (2) A member must be a Justice of the Peace.

5. Applying for membership

- (1) A person who wants to become a member must apply in writing to the Association.
- (2) The application must be signed by the applicant.
- (3) The applicant must complete the application form.

6. Dealing with membership applications

- (1) The Council must consider each application for membership of the Association and decide whether to accept or reject the application.
- (2) The Council may delay its consideration of an application if the Council considers that any matter relating to the application needs to be clarified by the applicant or that the applicant needs to provide further information in support of the application.
- (3) The Council must not accept an application unless the applicant
 - (a) is eligible under rule 4; and
 - (b) has applied under rule 5.
- (4) The Council may reject an application even if the applicant
 - (a) is eligible under rule 4; and
 - (b) has applied under rule 5.
- (5) The Council must notify the applicant of the Council's decision to accept or reject the application as soon as practicable after making the decision.
- (6) If the Council rejects the application, the Council is not required to give the applicant its reasons for doing so.

7. Becoming a member

An applicant for membership of the Association becomes a member when —

- (a) the Council approves the application; and
- (b) the applicant pays any membership fees payable to the Association under rule 12.

8. Classes of membership

- (1) The Association consists of ordinary members and any other members provided for under subrule (2).
- (2) The Association may have any class of associate membership approved by resolution at a general meeting, including junior membership, senior membership, honorary membership and life membership.
- (3) A person can only be an ordinary member or belong to one class of associate membership.
- (4) An ordinary member has full voting rights and any other rights conferred on members by these rules or approved by resolution at a general meeting.
- (5) An associate member has the rights referred to in subrule (5) other than full voting rights.
- (6) The number of members of any class is not limited unless otherwise approved by resolution at a general meeting.

9. When membership ceases

- (1) A person ceases to be a member when any of the following events takes place
 - (a) for a member who is an individual, the individual dies.
 - (b) the person resigns from the Association under rule 10.
 - (c) the person is expelled from the Association under rule 15.
 - (d) the person ceases to be a member under rule 12(4).
- (2) A record must be kept, for at least one year after a person ceases to be a member:
 - (a) from the date on which the person ceased to be a member; and
 - (b) the reason why the person ceased to be a member.

10. Resignation

- (1) A member may resign from membership of the Association by giving written notice of the resignation.
- (2) The resignation takes effect
 - (a) once the notice is received; or
 - (b) if a later time is stated in the notice, at that later time.
- (3) A person who has resigned from membership of the Association remains liable for any fees that are owed to the Association (the **owed amount**) at the time of resignation.
- (4) The owed amount may be recovered by a debt collector or the Association in a court of competent jurisdiction as a debt due to the Association.

11. Rights not transferable

(1) The rights of a member are not transferable and end when membership ceases.

Division 2 — Membership fees

12. Membership fees

- (1) The Council must determine the entrance fee (if any) and the annual membership fee (if any) to be paid for membership of the Association.
- (2) The fees determined under subrule (1) may be different for different classes of membership.
- (3) A member must pay the annual membership fee by the date (the *due date*) determined by the Council.
- (4) If a member has not paid the annual membership fee within the period of 3 months after the due date, the member ceases to be a member on the expiry of that period.
- (5) If a person who has ceased to be a member under subrule (4) offers to pay the annual membership fee after the period referred to in that subrule has expired
 - (a) the Council may, at its discretion, accept that payment; and
 - (b) if the payment is accepted, the person's membership is reinstated from the date the payment is accepted.

Division 3 — Register of members

13. Register of members

- (1) A person authorised by the Council, is responsible for the requirements imposed on the Association under section 53 of the Act to maintain the register of members and record in that register any change in the membership of the Association.
- (2) In addition to the matters referred to in section 53(2) of the Act, the register of members must include the class of membership (if applicable) to which each member belongs and the date on which each member becomes a member.
- (3) The register of members will be stored using available technologies and equipment, but in keeping with records management principles will be backed up by a copy that is kept in the cloud and can be migrated to new technologies as they emerge.
- (4) A member who wishes to inspect the register of members must contact the office to make the necessary arrangements.
- (5) If
 - (a) a member inspecting the register of members wishes to make a copy of, or take an extract from, the register under section 54(2) of the Act; or
 - (b) a member makes a written request under section 56(1) of the Act to be provided with a copy of the register of members,

the Council may require the member to provide a statutory declaration setting out the purpose for which the copy or extract is required and declaring that the purpose is connected with the affairs of the Association.

PART 4. DISCIPLINARY ACTION, DISPUTES AND MEDIATION

Division 1 — Term used

14. Term used: member

In this Part —

Member, in relation to a member, also refers to a member who is expelled from the Association and includes former member(s).

Division 2 — Disciplinary Action

15. Suspension or expulsion

- (1) The Council may decide to suspend a member's membership or to expel a member from the Association if —
 - (a) the member contravenes any of these rules; or
 - (b) the member acts detrimentally to the interests of the Association; or
 - (c) the member repeatedly sends messages to staff or other members of the Association in a manner which an ordinary person in reasonable circumstances may perceive as being a form of harassment or abuse.
- (2) The member must be provided with written notice of the proposed suspension or expulsion at least 28 days before the Council meeting at which the proposal is to be considered by the Council.
- (3) The notice given to the member must state
 - (a) when and where the Council meeting is to be held; and
 - (b) the grounds on which the proposed suspension or expulsion is based; and
 - (c) that the member, or the member's representative, may attend the meeting and will be given a reasonable opportunity to make written or oral (or both written and oral) submissions to the Council about the proposed suspension or expulsion.
- (4) At the Council meeting, the Council must
 - (a) give the member, or the member's representative, a reasonable opportunity to make written or oral (or both written and oral) submissions to the Council about the proposed suspension or expulsion; and
 - (b) give due consideration to any submissions so made; and
 - (c) decide
 - (i) whether or not to suspend the member's membership and, if the decision is to suspend the membership, the period of suspension; or
 - (ii) whether or not to expel the member from the Association.
- (5) A decision of the Council to suspend the member's membership or to expel the member from the Association takes immediate effect.
- (6) The Council must give the member written notice of the Council's decision, and the reasons for the decision, within 7 days after the Council meeting at which the decision is made.
- (7) A member whose membership is suspended or who is expelled from the Association may, within 14 days after receiving notice of the Council's decision under subrule (6), give written notice to the Council requesting the appointment of a mediator under rule 23.

(8) If notice is given under subrule (7), the member who gives the notice and the Council are the parties to the mediation.

16. Consequences of suspension

- (1) During the period a member's membership is suspended, the member
 - (a) loses any rights (including voting rights) arising as a result of membership; and
 - (b) is not entitled to a refund, rebate, relief or credit for membership fees paid, or payable, to the Association.
- (2) When a member's membership is suspended, it must be recorded in the register of members-
 - (a) that the member's membership is suspended; and
 - (b) the date on which the suspension takes effect; and
 - (c) the period of the suspension.
- (3) When the period of the suspension ends, it must be recorded in the register of members that the member's membership is no longer suspended.

Division 3 — Resolving disputes

17. Terms used

In this Division —

grievance procedure means the procedures set out in this Division.

party to a dispute includes a financial member who has lodged a complaint with the Association and it has not been resolved to both party's satisfaction.

18. Application of Division

The procedure set out in this Division (the grievance procedure) applies to disputes —

- (a) between members; or
- (b) between one or more members and the Association.

19. Parties to attempt to resolve dispute

The parties to a dispute must attempt to resolve the dispute between themselves within 14 days after the dispute has come to the attention of each party.

20. How grievance procedure is started

- (1) If the parties to a dispute are unable to resolve the dispute between themselves within the time required by rule 19, any party to the dispute may start the grievance procedure by giving written notice to the Council of
 - (a) the parties to the dispute; and
 - (b) the matters that are the subject of the dispute.
- (2) Within 28 days after the Council is given the notice, a Council meeting must be convened to consider and determine the dispute.
- (3) The Council must give each party to the dispute written notice of the Council meeting at which the dispute is to be considered and determined at least 7 days before the meeting is held.

- (4) The notice given to each party to the dispute must state
 - (a) when and where the Council meeting is to be held; and
 - (b) that the party, or the party's representative, may attend the meeting and will be given a reasonable opportunity to make written or oral (or both written and oral) submissions to the Council about the dispute.
- (5) If
 - (a) the dispute is between one or more members and the Association; and
 - (b) any party to the dispute gives written notice to the Council stating that the party
 - (i) does not agree to the dispute being determined by the Council; and
 - (ii) requests the appointment of a mediator under rule 23,

the Council must not determine the dispute.

21. Determination of dispute by Council

- (1) At the Council meeting at which a dispute is to be considered and determined, the Council must
 - (a) give each party to the dispute, or the party's representative, a reasonable opportunity to make written or oral (or both written and oral) submissions to the Council about the dispute; and
 - (b) give due consideration to any submissions so made; and
 - (c) determine the dispute.
- (2) The Council must give each party to the dispute written notice of the Council's determination, and the reasons for the determination, within 7 days after the Council meeting at which the determination is made.
- (3) A party to the dispute may, within 14 days after receiving notice of the Council's determination under subrule (1)(c), give written notice to the Council requesting the appointment of a mediator under rule 23.
- (4) If notice is given under subrule (3), each party to the dispute is a party to the mediation.

Division 4 — Mediation

22. Application of Division

- (1) This Division applies if written notice has been given to the Council requesting the appointment of a mediator —
 - (a) by a member under rule 15(7); or
 - (b) by a party to a dispute under rule 20(5)(b)(ii) or 21(3).
- (2) If this Division applies, a mediator must be chosen or appointed under rule 23.

23. Appointment of mediator

- (1) The mediator must be a person chosen
 - (a) if the appointment of a mediator was requested by a member under rule 15(7) by agreement between the Member and the Council; or
 - (b) if the appointment of a mediator was requested by a party to a dispute under rule 20(5)(b)(ii) or 21(3) by agreement between the parties to the dispute.
- (2) If there is no agreement for the purposes of subrule (1)(a) or (b), then, subject to subrules (3) and (4), the Council must appoint the mediator.
- (3) The person appointed as mediator by the Council must be a person who acts as a mediator for another not-for-profit body, such as a community legal centre, if the appointment of a mediator was requested by
 - (a) a member under rule 15(7); or
 - (b) a party to a dispute under rule 20(5)(b)(ii); or
 - (c) a party to a dispute under rule 21(3) and the dispute is between one or more members and the Association.
- (4) The person appointed as mediator by the Council may be a member or former member of the Association but must not
 - (a) have a personal interest in the matter that is the subject of the mediation; or
 - (b) be biased in favour of or against any party to the mediation.

24. Mediation process

- (1) The parties to the mediation must attempt in good faith to settle the matter that is the subject of the mediation.
- (2) Each party to the mediation must give the mediator a written statement of the issues that need to be considered at the mediation at least 5 days before the mediation takes place.
- (3) In conducting the mediation, the mediator must
 - (a) give each party to the mediation every opportunity to be heard; and
 - (b) allow each party to the mediation to give due consideration to any written statement given by another party; and
 - (c) ensure that natural justice is given to the parties to the mediation throughout the mediation process.
- (4) The mediator cannot determine the matter that is the subject of the mediation.
- (5) The mediation must be confidential, and any information given at the mediation cannot be used in any other proceedings that take place in relation to the matter that is the subject of the mediation.
- (6) The costs of the mediation are to be paid by the complainant.

25. If mediation results in decision to suspend or expel being revoked

If —

- (a) mediation takes place because a member whose membership is suspended or who is expelled from the Association gives notice under rule 15(7); and
- (b) as the result of the mediation, the decision to suspend the member's membership or expel the member is revoked,

that revocation does not affect the validity of any decision made at a Council meeting or general meetings during the period of suspension or expulsion.

PART 5 - COUNCIL

Division 1 — Powers of Council

26. Council

- (1) The Council members are the persons who have the power to manage the affairs of the Association.
- (2) Subject to the Act, these rules, the by-laws (if any) and any resolution passed at a general meeting, the Council has power to do all things necessary or convenient to be done for the proper management of the affairs of the Association.
- (3) The Council must take all reasonable steps to ensure that the Association complies with the Act, these rules and the by-laws (if any).
- (4) The Council has the powers to create and change by-laws as it deems necessary. It may also produce policies and procedures the latter of which may be changed by any member of the Council without Council endorsement.

Division 2 — Composition of Council and duties of members

27. Council members

- (1) The Council members consist of
 - (a) The office holders of the Association; and
 - (b) At least one ordinary Council member.
- (2) The Council must determine the maximum number of members who may be ordinary Council members.
- (3) The following are the office holders of the Association
 - (a) the President.
 - (b) the Deputy President.
 - (c) the Treasurer.
- (4) A person may be a Council member if the person is
 - (a) an individual who has reached 18 years of age; and
 - (b) an ordinary member.
- (5) A person must not hold 2 or more of the offices mentioned in subrule (3) at the same time.

28. President

- (1) It is the duty of the President to consult with the Council regarding the business to be conducted at each Council meeting and general meeting.
- (2) The President has the powers and duties relating to convening and presiding at Council meetings and presiding at general meetings provided for in these rules.

29. Council

The Council has the following responsibilities, which it may delegate to a Council member(s) or to its Registrar, if appointed —

- (a) dealing with the Association's correspondence.
- (b) consulting with the President regarding the business to be conducted at each Council meeting and general meeting.
- (c) preparing the notices required for the meetings and for the business to be conducted and meetings.
- (d) unless another member is authorised by the Council to do so, maintaining on behalf of the Association the register of members, and recording in the register any changes in the membership, as required under section 53(1) of the Act.
- (e) maintaining on behalf of the Association an up-to-date copy of these rules, as required under section 35(1) of the Act.
- (f) unless another member is authorised by the Council to do so, maintaining on behalf of the Association a record of Council members and other persons authorised to act on behalf of the Association, as required under section 58(2) of the Act.
- (g) ensuring the safe custody of the books of the Association, other than the financial records, financial statements and financial reports, as applicable to the Association.
- (h) maintaining full and accurate minutes of Council meetings and general meetings.
- (i) carrying out any other duty given to the Council under these rules or by the Council.

30. Treasurer

The Treasurer has the following duties —

- (a) ensuring that any amounts payable to the Association are collected and issuing receipts for those amounts in the Association's name.
- (b) ensuring that any amounts paid to the Association are credited to the appropriate account of the Association, as directed by the Council.
- (c) ensuring that any payments to be made by the Association that have been authorised by the Council or at a general meeting are made on time.
- (d) ensuring that the Association complies with the relevant requirements of Part 5 of the Act.
- (e) ensuring the safe custody of the Association's financial records, financial statements and financial reports, as applicable to the Association.
- (f) if the Association is a tier 1 Association, coordinating the preparation of the Association's financial statements before their submission to the Association's annual general meeting.
- (g) if the Association is a tier 2 Association or tier 3 Association, coordinating the preparation of the Association's financial report before its submission to the Association's annual general meeting.
- (h) providing any assistance required by an auditor or reviewer conducting an audit or review of the Association's financial statements or financial report under Part 5 Division 5 of the Act.

(i) carrying out any other duty given to the treasurer under these rules or by the Council.

31. Registrar

The Council may appoint a Registrar who may or may not be a Justice of the Peace. The Registrar may perform duties that are deemed responsibilities of the Council as delegated. A person appointed to act as the Registrar will be renumerated and accommodated according to the requirements of the *Fair Work Act* 2009.

Division 3 — Election of Council members and tenure of office

32. How members become Council members

A member becomes a Council member if the member —

- (a) is elected to the Council at a general meeting;
- (b) or is appointed to the Council by the Council to fill a casual vacancy.

33. Nomination of Council members

- (1) At least 42 days before an annual general meeting, the Council must send written notice to all the members
 - (a) calling for nominations for election to the Council; and
 - (b) stating the date by which nominations must be received by the Council to comply with subrule (2).
- (2) A member who wishes to be considered for election to the Council at the annual general meeting must nominate for election by sending written notice of the nomination to the Council at least 28 days before the annual general meeting.
- (3) The written notice must include a statement by another member in support of the nomination.
- (4) A member may nominate for one specified position of office holder of the Association or to be an ordinary Council member.
- (5) A member whose nomination does not comply with this rule is not eligible for election to the Council unless the member is nominated under rule 33(2) or 35(2)(b).

34. Election of office holders

- (1) At the annual general meeting, a separate election must be held for each position of office holder of the Association.
- (2) If there is no nomination for a position, the chairperson of the meeting may call for nominations from the ordinary members at the meeting.
- (3) If only one member has nominated for a position, the chairperson of the meeting must declare the Member elected to the position.
- (4) If more than one member has nominated for a position, the ordinary members at the meeting must vote in accordance with procedures that have been determined by the Council to decide who is to be elected to the position.
- (5) Each ordinary member present at the meeting may vote for one member who has nominated for the position.

- (6) A member who has nominated for the position may vote for himself or herself.
- (7) On the member's election, the new President of the Association may take over as the Chairperson of the meeting.

35. Election of ordinary Council members

- (1) At the annual general meeting, the Association must decide by resolution the number of ordinary Council members (if any) to hold office for the next year.
- (2) If the number of members nominating for the position of ordinary Council member is not greater than the number to be elected, the chairperson of the meeting
 - (a) must declare each of those members to be elected to the position; and
 - (b) may call for further nominations from the ordinary members at the meeting to fill any positions remaining unfilled after the elections under paragraph (a).
- (3) If
 - (a) the number of members nominating for the position of ordinary Council member is greater than the number to be elected; or
 - (b) the number of members nominating under subrule (2)(b) is greater than the number of positions remaining unfilled,

the ordinary members at the meeting must vote in accordance with procedures that have been determined by the Council to decide the members who are to be elected to the position of ordinary Council member.

(4) A member who has nominated for the position of ordinary Council member may vote in accordance with that nomination.

36. Term of office

- (1) The term of office of a Council member begins when the member
 - (a) is elected at an annual general meeting or under subrule 37(3)(b); or
 - (b) is appointed to fill a casual vacancy.
- (2) Subject to rule 38, a Council member holds office until the positions on the Council are declared vacant at the next annual general meeting.
- (3) A Council member may be re-elected.

37. Resignation and removal from office

- (1) A Council member may resign from the Council by written notice given to the Council or, if the resigning member is the Council, given to the President.
- (2) The resignation takes effect
 - (a) when the notice is received by the Council or President; or
 - (b) if a later time is stated in the notice, at the later time.
- (3) At a general meeting, the Association may by resolution
 - (a) remove a Council member from office; and
 - (b) elect a member who is eligible under rule 27(4) to fill the vacant position.

- (4) A Council member who is the subject of a proposed resolution under subrule (3)(a) may make written representations (of a reasonable length) to the Council or President and may ask that the representations be provided to the members.
- (5) The Council or President may give a copy of the representations to each member or, if they are not so given, the Council member may require them to be read out at the general meeting at which the resolution is to be considered.

38. When membership of Council ceases

A person ceases to be a Council member if the person —

- (1) dies or otherwise ceases to be a member; or
- (2) resigns from the Council or is removed from office under rule 36; or
- (3) becomes ineligible to accept an appointment or act as a Council member under section 39 of the Act.
- (4) becomes permanently unable to act as a Council member because of a mental or physical disability; or
- (5) fails to attend 4 consecutive Council meetings, of which the person has been given notice, without having notified the Council that the person will be unable to attend.

39. Filling casual vacancies

- (1) The Council may appoint a member who is eligible under rule 27(4) to fill a position on the Council that —
 - (a) has become vacant under rule 38; or
 - (b) was not filled by election at the most recent annual general meeting or under rule 37(3)(b).
- (2) If the position on Council becomes vacant, the Council must appoint a member who is eligible under rule 27(4) to fill the position within 28 days after the vacancy arises.
- (3) Subject to the requirement for a quorum under rule 46, the Council may continue to act despite any vacancy in its membership.
- (4) If there are fewer Council members than required for a quorum under rule 46, the Council may act only for the purpose of
 - (a) appointing Council members under this rule; or
 - (b) convening a general meeting.

40. Validity of acts

The acts of a committee or subcommittee, or of a Council member or member of a subcommittee, are valid despite any defect that may afterwards be discovered in the election, appointment or qualification of a Council member or member of a subcommittee.

41. Payments to Council members

(1) In this rule —

Council member includes a member of a subcommittee or branch.

Council meeting includes a meeting of a subcommittee or branch.

- (2) A Council member is entitled to be paid out of the funds of the Association for any out-of-pocket expenses for travel and accommodation properly incurred
 - (a) in attending a Council meeting or
 - (b) in attending a general meeting; or
 - (c) otherwise in connection with the Association's business.

Division 4 — Council meetings

42. Council meetings

- (1) The Council must meet at least 3 times in each year on the dates and at the times and places determined by the Council.
- (2) The date, time and place of the first Council meeting must be determined by the Council members as soon as practicable after the annual general meeting at which the Council members are elected.
- (3) Special Council meetings may be convened by the President or any 2 Council members.

43. Notice of Council meetings

- (1) Notice of each Council meeting must be given to each Council member at least 48 hours before the time of the meeting.
- (2) The notice must state the date, time and place of the meeting and must describe the general nature of the business to be conducted at the meeting.

44. Procedure and order of business

- (1) The President or, in the President's absence, the Deputy_President must preside as chairperson of each Council meeting.
- (2) If the President and Deputy President are absent or are unwilling to act as chairperson of a meeting, the Council members at the meeting must choose one of them to act as chairperson of the meeting.
- (3) The procedure to be followed at a Council meeting must be determined from time to time by the Council.
- (4) The order of business at a Council meeting may be determined by the Council members at the meeting.
- (5) A member or other person who is not a Council member may attend a Council meeting if invited to do so by the Council.
- (6) A person invited under subrule (5) to attend a Council meeting
 - (a) has no right to any agenda, minutes or other document circulated at the meeting; and
 - (b) must not comment about any matter discussed at the meeting unless invited by the Council to do so; and
 - (c) cannot vote on any matter that is to be decided at the meeting.

45. Use of technology to be present at Council meetings

- (1) The presence of a Council member at a Council meeting need not be by attendance in person but may be by that Council member and each other Council member at the meeting being simultaneously in contact by telephone or other means of instantaneous communication. This may include the use of online surveys, QR Codes or any use of technology that is unforeseeable at the time of ratifying these rules.
- (2) A member who participates in a Council meeting as allowed under subrule (1) is taken to be present at the meeting and, if the member votes at the meeting, the member is taken to have voted in person.

46. Quorum for Council meetings

- (1) Subject to rule 39(4), no business is to be conducted at a Council meeting unless a quorum is present.
- (2) If a quorum is not present within 30 minutes after the notified commencement time of a Council meeting
 - (a) in the case of a special meeting the meeting lapses; or
 - (b) otherwise, the meeting is adjourned to the same time, day and place in the following week.
- (3) If
 - (a) a quorum is not present within 30 minutes after the commencement time of a Council meeting held under subrule (2)(b);
 - (b) at least 2 Council members are present at the meeting; and

those members present are taken to constitute a quorum

47. Voting at Council meetings

- (1) Each Council member present at a Council meeting has one vote on any question arising at the meeting.
- (2) A motion is carried if a majority of the Council members present at the Council meeting vote in favour of the motion.
- (3) If the votes are divided equally on a question, the chairperson of the meeting has a second or casting vote.
- (4) A vote may take place by the Council members present indicating their agreement or disagreement or by a show of hands, unless the Council decides that a secret ballot is needed to determine a particular question.
- (5) If a secret ballot is needed, the chairperson of the meeting must decide how the ballot is to be conducted.

48. Minutes of Council meetings

- (1) The Council must ensure that minutes are taken and kept of each Council meeting.
- (2) The minutes must record the following
 - (a) the names of the Council members present at the meeting.
 - (b) the name of any person attending the meeting under rule 44(5).
 - (c) the business considered at the meeting.
 - (d) any motion on which a vote is taken at the meeting and the result of the vote.

- (3) The minutes of a Council meeting must be entered in the Association's minute book within 30 days after the meeting is held.
- (4) The President must ensure that the minutes of a Council meeting are reviewed and signed as correct by
 - (a) the chairperson of the meeting; or
 - (b) the chairperson of the next Council meeting.
- (5) When the minutes of a Council meeting have been signed as correct, they are, until the contrary is proved, evidence that
 - (a) the meeting to which the minutes relate was duly convened and held; and
 - (b) the matters recorded as having taken place at the meeting took place as recorded; and
 - (c) any appointment purportedly made at the meeting was validly made.

Division 5 — Subcommittees, subsidiary offices and branches

49. Subcommittees and subsidiary offices

- (1) To help the Council in the conduct of the Association's business, the Council may, in writing, do either or both of the following
 - (a) appoint one or more subcommittees.
 - (b) create one or more subsidiary offices and appoint people to those offices.
- (2) A subcommittee may consist of the number of people, whether or not members, that the Council considers appropriate.
- (3) A person may be appointed to a subsidiary office whether or not the person is a member.
- (4) Subject to any directions given by the Council
 - (a) a subcommittee may meet and conduct business as it considers appropriate; and
 - (b) the holder of a subsidiary office may carry out the functions given to the holder as the holder considers appropriate.
- (5) A branch is not deemed to be a subsidiary office unless designated as such by the Council.

50. Delegation to subcommittees and holders of subsidiary offices

(1) In this rule —

non-delegable duty means a duty imposed on the Council by the Act or another written law.

- (2) The Council may, in writing, delegate to a subcommittee or the holder of a subsidiary office the exercise of any power or the performance of any duty of the Council other than
 - (a) the power to delegate; and
 - (b) a non-delegable duty.
- (3) A power or duty, the exercise or performance of which has been delegated to a subcommittee or the holder of a subsidiary office under this rule, may be exercised or performed by the subcommittee or holder in accordance with the terms of the delegation.
- (4) The delegation may be made subject to any conditions, qualifications, limitations or exceptions that the Council specifies in the document by which the delegation is made.

- (5) The delegation does not prevent the Council from exercising or performing at any time the power or duty delegated.
- (6) Any act or thing done by a subcommittee or by the holder of a subsidiary office, under the delegation has the same force and effect as if it had been done by the Council.
- (7) The Council may, in writing, amend or revoke the delegation.

51. Branches

In this rule -

- (1) Branch means a subordinate group of the Association within a particular geographical location, formed with the Council's approval.
- (2) The purpose of a Branch is to
 - (a) enjoy and maintain social connections with Justices of the Peace in their area and
 - (b) provide a service for the various aspects of the work of Justices of the Peace in their area.
- (3) The branch must comply with the rules and by-laws (if any) of the Association.
- (4) The Council may determine to establish a branch on its own motion or at the request of a number of members in an area where the number will allow for roles to be filled according to these rules.
- (5) The rules of the Association will take precedence over any rule, by-law, policy or procedure of a branch.
- (6) A branch will form a committee in keeping with rule 27 but may also appoint a communications officer to manage its correspondence and minutes.
- (7) A communications officer will not by definition be a part of the committee executive.
- (8) Branch members may pay local membership fees as determined by the committee of the branch to create funds to facilitate their local activities.
- (9) The Council has the power to dissolve a branch where it is no longer effectively representing the interests of the Association in the area concerned or where there are insufficient local members to fill the roles required under these rules.
- (10) In the event of a branch ceasing to operate, funds accumulated by the branch that are less than \$200 should be used for a final social event.
 - (a) funds in excess of \$200 that are forwarded to the Association will be used to cover any administrative and clerical costs related to the closure of the branch or any other expense of the Association; and
 - (b) will no longer be identified as belonging to the branch and as such will not be held by the Association in the name of any former branch except in the case where there is reason to believe that the branch may re-form in the short term, as decided by the Council.
- (11) Members of a branch of the Association who choose to depart from the branch's current status in order to become an entity which is separate and distinct from the Association may not:
 - (a) use any intellectual property of the Association.
 - (b) use any physical property of the Association.
 - (c) canvass any member of the Association to join the new entity. For the purposes of 'join' this includes any regular contact such as online, phone or postal communications as well as any online meetings such as through Zoom, Teams or other electronic media used for that purpose.

6. GENERAL MEETINGS OF ASSOCIATION

52. Annual general meeting

- (1) The Council must determine the date, time and place of the annual general meeting.
- (2) If it is proposed to hold the annual general meeting more than 6 months after the end of the Association's financial year, the Council must apply to the Commissioner for permission under section 50(3)(b) of the Act within 4 months after the end of the financial year.
- (3) The ordinary business of the annual general meeting is as follows
 - (a) to confirm the minutes of the previous annual general meeting and of any special general meeting held since then if the minutes of that meeting have not yet been confirmed.
 - (b) to receive and consider
 - (i) the Council's annual report on the Association's activities during the preceding financial year; and
 - (ii) if the Association is a tier 1 Association, the financial statements of the Association for the preceding financial year presented under Part 5 of the Act;
 - (iii) if the Association is a tier 2 Association or a tier 3 Association, the financial report of the Association for the preceding financial year presented under Part 5 of the Act.
 - (iv) if required to be presented for consideration under Part 5 of the Act, a copy of the report of the review or auditor's report on the financial statements or financial report.
 - (c) to elect the office holders of the Association and other Council members.
 - (d) if applicable, to appoint or remove a reviewer or auditor of the Association in accordance with the Act.
 - (e) to confirm or vary the entrance fees, subscriptions and other amounts (if any) to be paid by members.
- (4) Any other business of which notice has been given in accordance with these rules may be conducted at the annual general meeting.

53. Special general meetings

- (1) The Council may convene a special general meeting.
- (2) The Council must convene a special general meeting if at least 1% of the members require a special general meeting to be convened.
 - (3) The members requiring a special general meeting to be convened must
 - (a) make the requirement by written notice given to the Council; and
 - (b) state in the notice the business to be considered at the meeting; and
 - (c) each sign the notice.
 - (4) The special general meeting must be convened within 28 days after notice is given under subrule (3)(a).
 - (5) If the Council does not convene a special general meeting within that 28 day period, the members making the requirement (or any of them) may convene the special general meeting.
 - (6) A special general meeting convened by members under subrule (5)
 - (a) must be held within 3 months after the date the original requirement was made; and

- (b) may only consider the business stated in the notice by which the requirement was made and any other urgent matter.
- (7) The Association must reimburse any reasonable expenses incurred by the members convening a special general meeting under subrule (5).

54. Notice of general meetings

- (1) The Council or, in the case of a special general meeting convened under rule 53(5), the members convening the meeting, must give to each member
 - (a) at least 21 days' notice of a general meeting if a special resolution is to be proposed at the meeting; or
 - (b) at least 14 days' notice of a general meeting in any other case.
- (2) The notice must
 - (a) specify the date, time and place of the meeting; and
 - (b) indicate the general nature of each item of business to be considered at the meeting; and
 - (c) if the meeting is the annual general meeting, include the names of the members who have nominated for election to the Council under rule 32(2); and
 - (d) if a special resolution is proposed
 - (i) set out the wording of the proposed resolution as required by section 51(4) of the Act; and
 - (ii) state that the resolution is intended to be proposed as a special resolution; and
 - (iii) comply with rule 55(7).

55. Proxies

- (1) Subject to subrule (2), an ordinary member may appoint an individual who is an ordinary member as his or her proxy to vote and speak on his or her behalf at any meeting of the Association. The appointment of an individual as a proxy to vote may be valid for one meeting, more than one meeting or cover a period, such as one full calendar year subject to the explicit consent of the ordinary member.
- (2) An ordinary member may be appointed the proxy for not more than 5 other members.
- (3) The appointment of a proxy must be in writing and signed by the member making the appointment.
- (4) The member appointing the proxy may give specific directions as to how the proxy is to vote on his or her behalf.
- (5) If no instructions are given to the proxy, the proxy may vote on behalf of the member in any matter as the proxy sees fit.
- (6) If the Council has approved a form for the appointment of a proxy, the member may use that form or any other form
 - (a) that clearly identifies the person appointed as the member's proxy; and
 - (b) that has been signed by the member.
- (7) Notice of a general meeting given to an ordinary member under rule 54 must
 - (a) state that the member may appoint an individual who is an ordinary member as a proxy for the meeting; and
 - (b) include a copy of any form that the Council has approved for the appointment of a proxy.
- (8) A form appointing a proxy must be given to the Council before the commencement of the general meeting for which the proxy is appointed.

(9) A form appointing a proxy sent by post or electronically is of no effect unless it is received by the Association not later than 24 hours before the commencement of the meeting.

56. Use of technology to be present at general meetings

- (1) The presence of a member at a general meeting need not be by attendance in person but may be by that member and each other member at the meeting being simultaneously in contact by telephone or other means of instantaneous communication.
- (2) A member who participates in a general meeting as allowed under subrule (1) is taken to be present at the meeting and, if the member votes at the meeting, the member is taken to have voted in person.

57. Presiding member and quorum for general meetings

- (1) The President or, in the President's absence, the Deputy President, must preside as chairperson of each general meeting.
- (2) If the President and Deputy President are absent or are unwilling to act as chairperson of a general meeting, the Council members at the meeting must choose one of them to act as chairperson of the meeting.
- (3) No business is to be conducted at a general meeting unless a quorum is present.
- (4) If a quorum is not present within 30 minutes after the notified commencement time of a general meeting —
 - (a) in the case of a special general meeting the meeting lapses; or
 - (b) in the case of the annual general meeting the meeting is adjourned to
 - (i) the same time and day in the following week; and
 - (ii) the same place, unless the President specifies another place at the time of the adjournment or written notice of another place is given to the members before the day to which the meeting is adjourned.
- (5) If
 - (a) a quorum is not present within 30 minutes after the commencement time of an annual general meeting held under subrule (4)(b); and
 - (b) at least 2 ordinary members are present at the meeting,

those members present are taken to constitute a quorum.

58. Adjournment of general meeting

- (1) The chairperson of a general meeting at which a quorum is present may, with the consent of a majority of the ordinary members present at the meeting, adjourn the meeting to another time at the same place or at another place.
- (2) Without limiting subrule (1), a meeting may be adjourned
 - (a) if there is insufficient time to deal with the business at hand; or
 - (b) to give the members more time to consider an item of business.
- (3) No business may be conducted on the resumption of an adjourned meeting other than the business that remained unfinished when the meeting was adjourned.
- (4) Notice of the adjournment of a meeting under this rule is not required unless the meeting is adjourned for 14 days or more, in which case notice of the meeting must be given in accordance with rule 54.

59. Voting at general meeting

- (1) On any question arising at a general meeting
 - (a) subject to subrule (6), each ordinary member has one vote unless the member may also vote on behalf of a body corporate under subrule (2); and
 - (b) ordinary members may vote personally or by proxy.
- (2) An ordinary member that is a body corporate may, in writing, appoint an individual, whether or not the individual is a member, to vote on behalf of the body corporate on any question at a particular general meeting or at any general meeting, as specified in the document by which the appointment is made.
- (3) A copy of the document by which the appointment is made must be given to the Council before any general meeting to which the appointment applies.
- (4) The appointment has effect until
 - (a) the end of any general meeting to which the appointment applies; or
 - (b) the appointment is revoked by the body corporate and written notice of the revocation is given to the Council.
- (5) Except in the case of a special resolution, a motion is carried if a majority of the ordinary members present at a general meeting vote in favour of the motion.
- (6) If votes are divided equally on a question, the chairperson of the meeting has a second or casting vote.
- (7) If the question is whether or not to confirm the minutes of a previous general meeting, only members who were present at that meeting may vote.
- (8) For a person to be eligible to vote at a general meeting as an ordinary member, or on behalf of an ordinary member that is a body corporate under subrule (2), the ordinary member
 - (a) must have been an ordinary member at the time notice of the meeting was given under rule 52: and
 - (b) must have paid any fee or other money payable to the Association by the member.

60. When special resolutions are required

- (1) A special resolution is required if it is proposed at a general meeting
 - (a) to affiliate the Association with another body; or
 - (b) to request the Commissioner to apply to the State Administrative Tribunal under section 109 of the Act for the appointment of a statutory manager.
- (2) Subrule (1) does not limit the matters in relation to which a special resolution may be proposed.

61. Determining whether resolution carried

(1) In this rule —

poll means the process of voting in relation to a matter that is conducted in writing.

- (2) Subject to subrule (4), the chairperson of a general meeting may, on the basis of general agreement or disagreement or by a show of hands, declare that a resolution has been
 - (a) carried; or
 - (b) carried unanimously; or
 - (c) carried by a particular majority; or

- (d) lost.
- (3) If the resolution is a special resolution, the declaration under subrule (2) must identify the resolution as a special resolution.
- (4) If a poll is demanded on any question by the chairperson of the meeting or by at least 3 other ordinary members present in person or by proxy
 - (a) the poll must be taken at the meeting in the manner determined by the chairperson.
 - (b) the chairperson must declare the determination of the resolution on the basis of the poll.
- (5) If a poll is demanded on the election of the Chairperson or on a question of an adjournment, the poll must be taken immediately.
- (6) If a poll is demanded on any other question, the poll must be taken before the close of the meeting at a time determined by the Chairperson.
- (7) A declaration under subrule (2) or (4) must be entered in the minutes of the meeting, and the entry is, without proof of the voting in relation to the resolution, evidence of how the resolution was determined.

62. Minutes of general meeting

- (1) The Council, or a person authorised by the Council from time to time, must take and keep minutes of each general meeting.
- (2) The minutes must record the business considered at the meeting, any resolution on which a vote is taken and the result of the vote.
- (3) In addition, the minutes of each annual general meeting must record
 - (a) the number of the ordinary members attending the meeting.
 - (b) the number of proxy forms given to the chairperson of the meeting under rule 55(8).
 - (c) the number of members attending via electronic means.
 - (d) the financial statements or financial report presented at the meeting, as referred to in rule 52(3)(b)(ii) or (iii); and
 - (e) any report of the review or auditor's report on the financial statements or financial report presented at the meeting, as referred to in rule 52(3)(b)(iv).
- (4) The minutes of a general meeting must be entered in the Association's minute book within 30 days after the meeting is held.
- (5) The President must ensure that the minutes of a general meeting are reviewed and signed as correct by
 - (a) the chairperson of the meeting; or
 - (b) the chairperson of the next general meeting.
- (6) When the minutes of a general meeting have been signed as correct, they are, in the absence of evidence to the contrary, taken to be proof that
 - (a) the meeting to which the minutes relate was duly convened and held; and
 - (b) the matters recorded as having taken place at the meeting took place as recorded; and
 - (c) any election or appointment purportedly made at the meeting was validly made.

PART 7 — FINANCIAL MATTERS

63. Source of funds

(1) The funds of the Association may be derived from entrance fees, annual subscriptions, donations, fund-raising activities, grants, interest and any other sources approved by the Council.

64. Control of funds

- (1) The Association must open an account in the name of the Association with a financial institution from which all expenditure of the Association is made and into which all funds received by the Association are deposited.
- (2) Subject to any restrictions imposed at a general meeting, the Council may approve expenditure on behalf of the Association.
- (3) The Council may authorise the treasurer to expend funds on behalf of the Association up to a specified limit without requiring approval from the Council for each item on which the funds are expended.
- (4) All cheques, drafts, bills of exchange, promissory notes and other negotiable instruments of the Association must be signed by
 - (a) Any two of three authorised Council members; or
 - (b) Any of the three authorised Council members and a person authorised by the Council.
- (5) All funds of the Association must be deposited into the Association's account within 30 working days after their receipt.
- (6) No donation can be made to another charity under any circumstances.

65. Financial statements and financial reports

- (1) For each financial year, the Council must ensure that the requirements imposed on the Association under Part 5 of the Act relating to the financial statements or financial report of the Association are met.
- (2) Without limiting subrule (1), those requirements include
 - (a) if the Association is a tier 1 Association, the preparation of the financial statements; and
 - (b) if the Association is a tier 2 Association or tier 3 Association, the preparation of the financial report; and
 - (c) if required, the review or auditing of the financial statements or financial report, as applicable; and
 - (d) the presentation to the annual general meeting of the financial statements or financial report, as applicable; and
 - (e) if required, the presentation to the annual general meeting of the copy of the report of the review or auditor's report, as applicable, on the financial statements or financial report.

PART 8 — GENERAL MATTERS

66. By-laws

- (1) The Association may, by resolution at a general meeting, make, amend or revoke by-laws.
- (2) By-laws may
 - (a) provide for the rights and obligations that apply to any classes of associate membership approved under rule 8(2); and
 - (b) impose restrictions on the Council's powers, including the power to dispose of the Association's assets; and
 - (c) impose requirements relating to the financial reporting and financial accountability of the Association and the auditing of the Association's accounts; and
 - (d) provide for any other matter the Association considers necessary or convenient to be dealt with in the by-laws.
- (3) A by-law is of no effect to the extent that it is inconsistent with the Act, the regulations or these
- (4) Without limiting subrule (3), a by-law made for the purposes of subrule (2)(c) may only impose requirements on the Association that are additional to, and do not restrict, a requirement imposed on the Association under Part 5 of the Act.
- (5) At the request of a member, the Association must make a copy of the by-laws available for inspection by the member.

67. Executing documents and common seal

- (1) The Association may execute a document without using a common seal if the document is signed by
 - (a) 2 Council members; or
 - (b) one Council member and a person authorised by the Council.
- (2) If the Association has a common seal
 - (a) the name of the Association must appear in legible characters on the common seal;and
 - (b) a document may only be sealed with the common seal by the authority of the Council and in the presence of
 - (i) 2 Council members; or
 - (ii) one Council member and a person authorised by the Council,

and each of them is to sign the document to attest that the document was sealed in their presence.

- (3) The Council must make a written record of each use of the common seal.
- (4) The common seal must be kept in the custody of the Council, or another Council member authorised by the Council.

68. Giving notices to members

(1) In this rule —

recorded means recorded in the register of members.

(2) A notice or other document that is to be given to a member under these rules is taken not to have been given to the member unless it is in writing and —

- (a) delivered by hand to the recorded address of the member; or
- (b) sent by prepaid post to the recorded postal address of the member; or
- (c) sent by facsimile or electronic transmission to an appropriate recorded number or recorded electronic address of the member.

69. Custody of books and securities

- (1) Subject to subrule (2), the books and any securities of the Association must be kept in the Council's custody or under the Council's control.
- (2) The financial records and, as applicable, the financial statements or financial reports of the Association must be kept in the treasurer's custody or under the treasurer's control.
- (3) Subrules (1) and (2) have effect except as otherwise decided by the Council.
- (4) The books of the Association must be retained for at least 7 years.

70. Record of office holders

(1) The record of Council members and other persons authorised to act on behalf of the Association that is required to be maintained under section 58(2) of the Act must be kept in the Council's custody or under the Council's control.

71. Inspection of records and documents

Subrule (2) applies to a member who wants to inspect —

- (a) the register of members under section 54(1) of the Act; or
 - (b) the record of the names and addresses of Council members, and other persons authorised to act on behalf of the Association, under section 58(3) of the Act; or
 - (c) any other record or document of the Association.
- (2) The member must contact the Council to make the necessary arrangements for the inspection.
- (3) The inspection must be free of charge however any request for copies will incur a reasonable fee as per the Council's decision.
- (4) If the member wants to inspect a document that records the minutes of a Council meeting, the right to inspect that document is subject to any decision the Council has made about minutes of Council meetings generally, or the minutes of a specific Council meeting, being available for inspection by members.
- (5) The member may make a copy of or take an extract from a record or document referred to in subrule (1)(c) but does not have a right to remove the record or document for that purpose.
- (6) The member must not use or disclose information in a record or document referred to in subrule (1)(c) except for a purpose
 - (a) that is directly connected with the affairs of the Association; or
 - (b) that is related to complying with a requirement of the Act.

72. Publication by Council members of statements about Association business prohibited

- (1) A Council member must not publish, or cause to be published, any statement about the business conducted by the Association at a general meeting or Council meeting unless
 - (a) the Council member has been authorised to do so at a Council meeting; and

(b) the authority given to the Council member has been recorded in the minutes of the Council meeting at which it was given.

73. Distribution of surplus property on cancellation of incorporation or winding up

(1) In this rule —

Surplus property, in relation to the Association, means property remaining after satisfaction of

- (a) the debts and liabilities of the Association.
- (b) the costs, charges and expenses of winding up or cancelling the incorporation of the Association: and
- (c) does not include books relating to the management of the Association.
- (2) On the cancellation of the incorporation or the winding up of the Association, its surplus property must be distributed as determined by special resolution by reference to the persons mentioned in section 24(1) of the Act.

74. Alteration of rules

(1) If the Association wants to alter or rescind any of these rules, or to make additional rules, the Association may do so only by special resolution and by otherwise complying with Part 3 Division 2 of the Act.
